**Additional grants** are provided by growing projects of Foods Resource Bank. In 2010, Brethren-related growing projects raised \$276,000 to invest in food security measures abroad. The proceeds for 2011 are still being gathered. Currently the Church of the Brethren is the lead sponsor of FRB programs in the Dominican Republic, Guatemala, Nicaragua, and North Korea. Since 2005, proceeds from the growing projects of Church of the Brethren congregations have provided agricultural development assistance to indigenous partners in more than 25 countries.
